ST3 – A Regional Investment

116-mile network across the Puget Sound

Includes:

West Seattle-Ballard Link Extensions



Currently under construction

Light rail extensions

- Northgate (3 stations, opening this year).
- Hilltop Tacoma (6 stations, 2022).
- East Link (10 stations, 2023).
- Lynnwood (4 stations, 2024).
- Federal Way (3 stations, 2024).
- Downtown Redmond (2 stations, 2024).

Other


- Operations & Maintenance Facility East (2021).
- Puyallup Station garage (2022).





Revenue sources

- Tax revenues fund 66%.
- Debt funds 18%.
- Grants fund 8%.
- Fares fund 7%.



Financial changes

Current 25-year capital program runs 2016-2041

 Lower Revenue: Lower sales, motor vehicle excise, and rental car taxes due to recession.

 Higher Costs: Construction costs remain at record levels due to continued growth in property values and hot construction market.

Financial changes through 2041

Current 25-year capital program runs 2016-2041

- Revenue: \$6.1 billion lower.
- Costs: \$12.3 billion higher. in estimate cost increases.
- Offsets: \$6.9 billion in new debt, higher grants and other revenue.

Overall: \$11.5 billion affordability gap.

Realignment tools available to Sound Transit

- Cutting costs through reduced project scope, suspending or canceling projects, etc.
- Raising new revenues through issuing higher debt or seeking additional state or federal funding.
- Delaying or phasing projects to spread costs over time and keep total agency debt within current legal limits.







- Build and operate new light rail system.


Center racial equity for better outcomes

Current City Work to Support ST3

- Establishing strong relationships with Sound Transit to identify issues early and craft solutions
- Creating teams for permitting, planning, and public engagement
- Working to support delivering light rail faster and within budget
- Collaborating with Sound Transit on a Racial Equity Toolkit to center issues of race


What is racial equity?

When social, economic and political opportunities are not determined by a person's race.




Chinatown-International District segment







Note: The Chinatown-International District Station 4th Avenue Shallow Alternative would necessitate reconstruction of the existing Stadium Station.











4th Avenue Shallow (CID-1a)





4th Avenue Deep Station Option (CID-1b)

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


5th Avenue Shallow (CID-2a)

So, what's an Environmental Impact Statement?


Or, "EIS" for short.

Provides agencies and the public an understanding of environmental consequences and assists in decision-making.



What is typically studied in an EIS?

Transportation impacts

- Acquisitions, displacements and relocations



Equity and inclusion

Environmental justice focus within each area of the EIS



Environmental justice

- Describes demographics
- ➤ Evaluates whether project disproportionately impacts minority and low-income communities
- Considers potential project benefits such as improved access to opportunity
- Documents what we hear from outreach efforts

Community engagement & collaboration

Coming up (Early to Mid-2021)

Focus: Prepare the community for publication of the DEIS, including updates around station planning and how to engage

DEIS publication (Mid-2021)

Focus: Share information found in Draft EIS and collect feedback

- Seek formal comments on the Draft EIS to share with the Sound Transit Board and Federal Transit Administration
 - Share information in a variety of formats (including online), focus
 on accessibility
 - Provide several ways for people to provide comments. For example, online, voicemail, email, in-language, public comment and more.
